FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL

With Week 4 already upon us, you could say our classrooms are well and truly humming. It is wonderful to witness the focus and drive evident by our students during the daily literacy block. A crucial part of this Literacy Block is conferencing. This is an opportunity for each student to sit down one-on-one with their teacher, each week, and discuss their reading and writing. This is a multi-faceted process and each conference is geared towards individual needs and progress. There are some common elements though, that teachers will pay attention to when they are listening to students read. Teachers will use these elements as a guide for the students in terms of where they need to go next in their reading development.



Phonemic awareness

The ability to hear the sounds in spoken words and understand that words are made up of sequences of sounds.



Phonics

Phonics instruction connects phonemes with written letters so that the reader can transfer knowledge of sounds to the printed word. Synthetic phonics' is the approach with the most robust evidence base.



Fluency

The ability to read quickly and naturally with accuracy and expression. Fluency contains the skill of automaticity which allows a reader to recognise words quickly.



Vocabulary

When children 'sound out' a word, their brain connects the pronunciation of a sequence of sounds to a word in their vocabulary to find a logical match. If a match is not created because the word they are reading is not in their vocabulary, comprehension is interrupted.



Comprehension

The understanding and interpretation of what is read. Comprehension requires having a sufficient vocabulary.

This week saw our Year 5 and 6 students engage in the My Body My Life program. This program is a two-part puberty and self -development program designed to bring parents and their children together to investigate the myriad of changes occurring during puberty and adolescence. This program is run at St Vincent's every second year and is facilitated by Catholic Archdiocese of Canberra and Goulburn.

On Monday evening, many parents accompanied their child to the interactive sessions which explored the physical, emotional



and psycho-social development from child to adult. On Tuesday morning, this was followed up by an in-class session where students could ask questions and share their own stories in a safe, supportive environment under the care of trained facilitators.

Each child's journey through adolescence is unique and we encourage each person to navigate this challenging time in a way that supports themselves and their family. I'd like to thank all parents who were able to attend the evening session. I'd also like to acknowledge the students who approached these

sessions with maturity and consideration for the needs of others.

Yesterday marked the beginning of the Season of Lent, with the celebration of Ash Wednesday. Students in Years K-6 attended Mass and reflected on the meaning of this important holy day in the liturgical calendar.

- Ash Wednesday takes place 46 days before Easter Sunday.
